

AUXILIARY ADJUTANT'S MESSAGE



igh on the DAV's national legislative agenda this year is S. 2193–The Caring for our Veterans Act of 2017, which has passed through the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee. It is a comprehensive Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) healthcare bill,

which includes provisions to overhaul the agency's community care program and provide additional funds to improve the VA healthcare system. However, it also includes a critical provision that would extend comprehensive VA caregiver benefits to severely injured veterans with no arbitrary cutoff date. The provision would immediately expand eligibility to severely injured veterans on or before May 7, 1975, and mandate full expansion to veterans of all eras within a two-year window.

During her recent testimony to the Joint Committee on Veterans Affairs, National Commander Delphine Metcalf-Foster spoke passionately about her struggle to care for her husband, Jimmy. Jimmy, also a veteran, suffered from Alzheimer's Disease. Delphine tried to care for her husband at home, but without any supports like specialized training or respite, she had no choice but to admit Jimmy to a nursing facility.

Delphine is not the only DAV member who has worn the hats

of both caregiver and veteran. This is one reason DAV Auxiliary membership is open to members of the DAV. Admittedly, it can be difficult for members of both organizations to include and be included. However, the comradeship that Auxiliary members who are not veterans find is equally as important to members who are veterans.

I believe that advocating for pro-veteran legislation is just one way to build Auxiliary membership with our DAV members. Another way is to encourage DAV and DAV Auxiliary members to participate fully in their units. Article III, Section 7, of the DAV Auxiliary National Constitution, states that a person who currently holds a DAV elected or appointed office and/or chairmanship in the DAV may not hold an elected or appointed office/position in the DAV Auxiliary. However, a person who has held a position in the parent organization in the past, but does not presently hold a DAV position, may certainly be elected or appointed to an Auxiliary position.

Our state convention in June offers a great opportunity for DAV and DAV Auxiliary members to become more involved. I invite all DAV Auxiliary members to come to our meetings and allow us to show you why being a member of this organization in so important.

AV made history at the 2018 National Midwinter Conference. On February 27, 2018, California's own, Delphine Metcalf-Foster, became the first woman veteran to address a joint session of the House and Senate Veterans Affairs Committee as the Commander of a major congressionally-chartered Veterans Service Organization.

However, as momentous as this year's Midwinter Conference was, it doesn't end there. On the contrary, we members of the DAV Department of California have a collective responsibility to ensure our representatives in congress hear not only from our National Commander, but also from us.

While Delphine Metcalf-Foster brought our concerns before the joint veterans affairs committees, a dedicated team from California, comprised of our State Commander, Past State Commanders, National Service Officers and the Department Benefits Protection Team Leader, brought veterans' concerns to California's legislators throughout the halls of congress: covering the Rayburn, Canon, Longworth, Dirksen, Russell and Hart buildings.

It was the team's goal to meet with as many of California's 54 congressional representatives as possible in the span of three days, which were also interspersed with insightful meetings and seminars held during the conference. On average, over the last three years, we've met with 18-22 members and/or their veteran legislative assistant every midwinter. That is a feat that no other department has come close to matching.

Our mission when conducting these visits is to discuss the importance of the legislation that's before them and is spelled out in DAV's Critical Policy Goals. During these meetings we're there to advocate for our fellow disabled veterans by providing them with real data and the positive affects the legislation we

support will have on the men and women who served, their families and dependents. We also point out potential negative affects should no action be taken. To drive our point home we provide them with the information they need to make an informed decision, such as our Independent Budget, The Unsung Heroes Report on Caregivers, the DAV 2017-2018 Legislative Program and the Critical Policy Goals for 2018.

This year, the highlights of our Critical Policy Goals were:

1) Expand Comprehensive Support for Caregivers to Veterans of All Eras; 2) Strengthen and Modernize the VA Health Care System; 3) Defend Our Benefits and Protect Our Future; 4) Improve Services and Recognition for Women Veterans; and 5) Provide Sufficient Funding for Veterans Healthcare and Benefits. Our National Legislative Director, Joy Ilem and the legislative staff have developed the tools necessary to help guide you through the process of advocacy, from how to contact your Representative to set up a meeting to how to construct a properly written Resolution, which is the hallmark of our legislative priorities.

It's important to understand, if we're to gain new, or preserve existing, benefits, we all need to get involved in the process. No one is going to do it for us, no matter how often we're referred to as heroes. What really counts is how our lawmakers vote. That's why we need to pay attention, and if they know we're paying attention to how they vote, we may succeed in getting the benefits we've earned.

hank you to all of you who showed up to our department midwinter conference this past January in Anaheim. Especially those of you who participated in our two-part Chapter Service Officer Training. Our department midwinter conference is shorter and more compact

Veteran Women's Issues

ur women veterans are important, but at times, their needs can be overlooked. We at the DAV Department of California are working to ensure that no veteran gets left behind. Here are some highlights and accomplishments regarding women veterans issues here in California and around the country.

From the National Interim Women Veterans Committee:

- In March, a bill known as the Deborah Sampson Act was introduced, a comprehensive measure aiming to address gender disparities and improve and expand programs and services for women veterans provided by the VA. Visit davcan.org to learn about more about the bill and voice your support to your lawmakers.
- This spring, we will be issuing an update to our groundbreaking 2014 report, Women Veterans: The Long Journey Home. We're very excited about this upcoming report and the critical boost it will give to some very important issues, so please watch for its release later this year.
- DAV has sponsored a number of retreat experiences for veterans with disabilities, in partnership with the Boulder Crest Retreat in Virginia. We are proud to have sponsored the very first all-women veterans retreat this past December, which brought together six women veterans from across the country to share their experiences in a comfortable, peer-support environment. The 7-day retreat echoed recommendations made in our 2014 report "Women Veterans: The Long Journey Home", calling for the VA and DoD to develop a pilot program for structured women's transition support groups to address issues with marriage, deployment, changing roles, child care and living as a dual military family.



From California:

-Women Veterans are the fastest growing demographic of homeless veterans. The DAV Department of

California and Chapter 7 in Oakland were instrumental in the push for the inclusion of feminine hygiene kits in disaster relief kits nationwide. Over the years, the lack of gender-specific products have created a service gap for women veterans at Stand Downs. Past State Commander, JR Wilson, was instrumental at the Stand Down on the Delta last year, which brought in 24 women veterans for the 4-day event. Also last year, at the Santa Barbara County Stand Down, US Army Veteran and DAV Department of California Women Veteran Chair, Penni Brown provided free haircuts.

- Department Women Veterans Chair, Penni Brown, will help hold a roundtable discussion on women veterans issues at our state convention. We want to hear from you on what challenges women face and what we can do to address them.
- Past department events have included a "Women Veterans Think Tank", a screening of the documentary, "Service: When Women Come Marching Home", women veterans conferences in Sacramento and continued legislative efforts to improve women veterans' access to healthcare.



-Chapter 6 in Sacramento, home to Past Chapter Commanders Dr. Mariana M. Raba, Patricia Wheeler, and Anna Sutton, hosts women veterans events at their chapter. Chapter 6 Treasurer and National Interim Women Veteran Committee member, Eldra Jackson, initiated this effort to provide women veterans with a platform to voice their concerns. He has played a vital role in advocating with and for women veterans to champion their inclusion, and as such, has provided great value to our organization. It's critical for us to have the support of our male counterparts, and it's an issue near to his heart as his mother, wife, and daughter all served in the US Army.
