
changes to make this year. Together the DAV and DAVA are becoming a more cohesive unit in the lives of our veterans.


Theatre or the Crest Theatre.

California Leads the Way in Streamlining Veteran Transportation Program



ack in January 2015, the Los Angeles Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) reached out to our national organization to inquire whether DAV had any veteran transportation needs. The MTA, after being awarded a \$285,000 government transportation software development grant, was looking for a worthy outlet. Thus began the lengthy process of developing a software database tool to help our Department Transportation Coordinators with their demanding jobs.

During the MTA's search for a veteran service organization for their program, they discovered through their data search that DAV had an extensive veteran patient transportation network established at VA hospitals and some clinics.

continued efforts to ensure that veterans in California do not go without the care they deserve due to lack of access to, or the ability to operate a vehicle.

Throughout the project, we continued to hold meetings during each phase of development. We discussed the database's requirements, and held on-site interviews with Transportation Coordinators to better understand the work environment this software would be used in, as well as the limitations we could encounter. We had to address whether the VA would allow our Transportation Coordinators to access the database on the internet using the VA system from their desk, and worked with the VA's IT manager at Loma Linda to work out any issues. With their help, Steve Salazar and Liza

We expect these additional features to make it easier for the veterans using our transportation network to get to their appointments.

Following the initial call from national, our Department Adjutant and CEO, Daniel Contreras, asked me to initiate a meeting with the principles at MTA to discuss initial details. We wanted to be sure that this step would, in fact, be an improvement to what our Transportation Coordinators were already using on a daily basis.

After this initial meeting and the creation of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with MTA, we began working on the project by assembling some of our Transportation Coordinators to guide us through the process. Their contributions to the ongoing discussion, design, and testing of the database were invaluable. Our team consisted of Steve Salazar, from the Loma Linda VA, Liza Thornton, from the Long Beach VA, Marie Pounds, from the Sepulveda VA Clinic, and Blas Barragan, Sr., from the West LA VA. Volunteer driver, Ernie Hilger, also occasionally came in to share a volunteer's perspective. Many thanks to all of these outstanding individuals for their

Thornton were able to operate the system at their location using a simulated pilot program. The test was successful, and the system worked as expected. As of July 2016, the new system is being used on a limited basis until our other Transportation Coordinators throughout the department can be brought up to speed on it.

We are still in the early phases and have laid out a roadmap of additional features to be added. We expect these additional features to make it easier for the veterans using our transportation network to get to their appointments, and return home via an Uber-like system. It is our hope that this will improve the services we provide our veterans, will help us fulfill our promises to the men and women who served, and will streamline the transportation program. This program could become a model for DAV transportation programs across the country with California leading the way.

Monterey Bay Veterans Launch PROGRAM

he DAV California Rehabilitation Foundation has had a long-standing partnership with the Monterey Bay Veterans. For years it has been a wonderful organization and we have been proud to contribute to their efforts. Their programs have provided veterans with fun events such as the fishing derbies. This past September held an

especially exciting moment in the history of the organization, and one that we were thrilled to be a part of. On September 27, 2016, the Monterey Bay Veterans dedicated a new custom dive boat. The boat which is appropriately named "Freedom" will give veterans with serious mobility issues the opportunity to try scuba diving.

DAV National Commander, Dave Riley, came for the ceremony and had the opportunity to take the inaugural dive. It was clear that Commander Riley, a former Coast Guard rescue swimmer, who is now a quadruple amputee, thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to dive with equipment designed to accommodate veterans with various types of physical limitations.

The "Freedom" features a submerging dive platform. This allows veterans with disabilities the ability to enter and exit the water safely. The "Freedom" is the first boat of its kind, and is sure to be a great resource for veterans. Adaptive sports have long been shown to have a positive impact on veterans, who are given the opportunity to get out and get active in a way they may not have been able to before.

The Monterey Bay Veterans will also be partnering with Cal State Monterey Bay, where

they will be able to use the aquatic facility to teach the veterans how to scuba dive before going into the water.

The DAV was represented at the dedication, with our own state commander, J.R. Wilson in attendance. James Bogan, PSC, and Kirk Johnson, PSC, were also in attendance. A special thanks to Mr. Bogan and Mr. Johnson for their involvement.

According to the VA, veterans who participate in adaptive sports report better health, new friendships, and a better

quality of life. Programs like these promote confidence, independence, comradery, and provide experiences that injured and ill veterans might not otherwise be able to have. We here at the DAV believe programs such as these are a great way to fulfill our promises to the men and women who served. It is always exciting to see new and creative ways for veterans to experience rehabilitation,

ways for veterans to experience rehabilitation, recovery, and enjoyment. Thanks to the Monterey Bay Veterans on their hard work in pursuit of the betterment of disabled veterans, and congrats on this exciting new chapter!
