



Our amazing organization provides disaster relief to qualified applicants in the form of financial aid for emergency food, shelter, and clothing as well as hygienic kits for needs. Requirements for relief are:

- The applicant must be an ill, injured or wounded veteran, or the spouse, or surviving spouse, thereof
- The applicant does not need to be a member or in receipt of serviceconnected compensation
- The applicant must be the victim of either an isolated or large-scale disaster.
- The applicant must be in immediate need of financial assistance

If you or anyone you know meets the above criteria, please contact your nearest National Service Office.

DAV PROGRESSES DESPITE OBSTACLES

All of our lives have been upended by the current pandemic in one way or another. Some of our chapters here in California have barely missed a beat, finding ways to continue meeting outdoors and serve veterans throughout the chaos of the past 18 months. However, other chapters have faced continuous challenges in finding meeting places or overcoming health issues or concerns. This year has brought about hope with the vaccines and a decline in deaths, however mutations on the virus continue to raise fear and confusion. At DAV we've worked to adapt, and we will continue to do so as we take gradual steps to re-open in a world that doesn't look quite the same.

I was able to attend the National Convention recently. And it was inspiring to hear from Commander, Butch Whitehead. Despite the pandemic, in 2020 our services resulted in veterans and their families obtaining more than \$23 billion in earned benefits throughout the nation. DAV national also expanded access to benefits and healthcare for Vietnam veterans suffering from the impacts of Agent Orange. Last year, more than 30,000 Vietnam veterans gained access to VA health care and received almost \$800 million in retroactive benefit payments due to the enactment and implementation of the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act. In addition, this past December, Congress

approved legislation to expand the list of presumptive Agent Orange diseases, extending health care and benefits to thousands more deserving Vietnam veterans.



Thank you to all of you who supported me at this past National Convention as I became National Second Jr. Vice Commander. It was great to gather again and see so many familiar faces for a while. We're always working and moving forward. I'm grateful to work alongside such a powerful team while witnessing the work of our fellow DAV members across the country.





CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

With the recent events in Afghanistan—the loss and chaos there and elsewhere in the world, I wanted to start this message with this quote: "There is a mighty strength that comes of the knowledge that you and I are sons and daughters of God. Within us is something of divinity. Those who have this knowledge and permit it to influence their lives will not stoop to do mean or cheap or tawdry things. Let us encourage the divinity within us to come to the surface."

If we thought about it, we'd probably realize that we really don't have anything that we haven't received from someone else. If we look at our lives and consider who and what has helped shape and create us, we would find many people had a hand. We would see family, friends, co-workers, teachers and others. I believe God has made us who we are through the assistance of others.



Lisa Beamer, widow of Todd Beamer, who famously said "Let's Roll" on 9-II-OI and helped take down the plane heading for Washington DC, spoke of missing the little things about Todd the most. As she spoke of her grief, she recalled a high school teacher she had growing up whose husband had died about a week earlier from a sudden heart attack. The teacher sat down on the edge of the desk, in the late afternoon sun, and with a gentle look of reflection on her face she paused and said, "class is over. I would like to share with you all something unrelated to class, but which I feel is very important.

"Each of us is put here on earth to learn, share, love, appreciate and give of ourselves. None of us knows when this fantastic experience will end. It can be taken away at any moment. Perhaps this is the Powers way of telling us that we must make the most out of every single day." Her eyes beginning to water, she went on, "So I would like you all to make me a promise. From now on, on your way to school, or on your way home, find something beautiful to notice. It doesn't have to be something you see, it could be a scent, perhaps of freshly baked

bread wafting out of someone's house, or it could be the sound of the breeze slightly rustling the leaves in the trees, or the way the morning light catches one autumn leaf as it falls gently to the ground. Please look for these things, and cherish them. For, although it may sound trite to some, these things are the 'stuff' of life. The little things we are put here on earth to enjoy. The things we often take for granted. We must make it important to notice them, for at any time it can all be taken away."

After that, Lisa's class was completely quiet. "We all picked up our books and filed out of the room silently. That afternoon, I noticed more things on my way home from school than I had that whole semester. Every once in a while, I think of that teacher and I try to appreciate all of those things that sometimes we all overlook."

Take notice of something special you see on your lunch hour today. Go barefoot, or walk on the beach at sunset. Stop off on the way home tonight to get a double dip ice cream cone. For as we get older, it is not the things we did that we often regret, but the things we didn't do.

Remember, "life is not measured by the number of breaths we take, but by the moments that take our breath away." You might want to try doing something that some friends of mine do. Often, as they see each

other when one returns home for the day, they'll gasp as they catch each other's eye. I think this is a wonderful way to greet someone special in our lives, or acknowledge a spectacular sunset. Discovering the beauty around us and the purpose of our own lives, individually and even collectively, is a challenging process. However, we can learn a lot about ourselves and the world and about our God by looking around us at all his handiwork, realizing how blessed we really are by the aide of so many who touch our lives.

As we truly take the time to soak in the beauties of nature and those people around us in our lives, we realize that none of this is just by chance. I believe our lives are each a very valuable part of a great and grand design. On "Personal Growth Retreats" in which I oversaw in the Marine Corps in the past, I experienced, often just for a few seconds, a glimpse of the infinite, and the meaning of life came to view. I saw new life come into the eyes of someone in despair as the result of a thoughtful look from another or being heard by someone with a desire to understand. Being filled with genuine care and concern for who and what is around us helps us see with clearer vision that God's hand is in everything. May we seek to look more clearly this week.

The DAV membership agreed the Women's Auxiliary, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, now known officially as the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary was formed at the 1922 DAV Convention, held in San Francisco.

DAV Auxiliary members are celebrating our organization's 100th anniversary. A partnership of this length is worth celebrating. For 100 years, auxiliary members have partnered with DAV members to advocate for pro-veteran legislation. We have spent a century volunteering at VA Medical Centers and other patriotic institutions. Most importantly, we celebrated our victories and mourned our losses together.

The DAV and DAV Auxiliary make a formidable team. The pandemic brought challenges and we overcame many of them. However, the need for social distancing has hindered our ability to maintain and recruit members for both our organizations. The occasion of our 100th anniversary provides an opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to support one another by actively recruiting disabled veterans and their families to join our ranks.




